## DACB at Africa International University (AIU)

The 2011-2012 academic year is a time of transition away from the Overseas Ministries Study Center for the *DACB*. As a result, the Project Luke fellowship program has been suspended temporarily. In August of 2011, Project Manager Michèle Sigg moved to Nairobi with her family (husband Sam, son Johan, daughters Annie and Catherine) for a year. Dur-

ing this time, she is working to install a regional office at AIU (formerly Nairobi Evangelical Graduate School of Theology) and to create a network of institutions ac-



tively engaged in oral history research on African church figures. She is also using this time to do field research and write the thesis for her M.Th in World Christianity. Sam is translating and editing for the *DACB* on a volunteer basis, doing some commercial translation, and building furniture for a children's home. Johan, who graduated from high school in June 2011, has undertaken several independent film projects and is volunteering at AIU as a video intern. Annie (11th grade) and Catherine (3rd grade) are attending West Nairobi School.

At AIU, the *DACB* is under the umbrella of the newly inaugurated Centre for World Christianity (CWC) directed by Dr. Mark Shaw. The CWC recently installed Dr. Andrew Walls as research professor in their new Ph.D in Intercultural Studies program that includes three *cont. p.2, col. 3* 

### Oral History Workshops in Nigeria and Madagascar



In April 2010, the DACB offered two oral history work-shops in

**Nigeria**. The workshop in Lagos was attended by about 20 individuals representing ten different institutions and a variety of churches. In Jos, approximately a dozen people representing five institutions participated in the workshop.

In October 2010, Oral historian Jean-Paul Wiest and DACB Project Manager Michèle Sigg traveled to **Madagascar** to teach two oral history workshops. In Majunga, twelve people, mostly university students, took part in the seminar. In

Antananarivo, the 25 participants represented 17 churches or institutions.

#### From the Project Director

I am pleased to report that the process of moving the DACB from OMSC--where it has been since 1997--to Boston University and Africa International University is moving along smoothly. Last summer, the DACB database was relocated to Boston University Libraries, where it is now being maintained as the nerve center of an envisaged complex of DACB-Wiki centers across Africa. Preliminary discussions have been held with Africa International University, in Nairobi, to ascertain the possibility of its serving as the first such center-a model for many other such centers of biographical research and writing in the coming years. Project Manager Michèle Sigg is there now, with her family, completing course and thesis requirements for her Masters of Theology in World Christianity from the Nairobi Graduate School of Theology.

The research and writing of stories would be an integral part of each participating institution's curricular requirements. This will yield carefully edited and regionally approved stories which will then be entered into the DACB database at Boston University. I should mention that at Boston University, the DACB will be governed by a university approved editorial committee. I have agreed to chair the committee for the next five years. Michèle Sigg will be a standing member of this committee, along with Dr. Dana Robert (Truman Collins Professor of World Christianity and History of Mission and Co-Director of the Center for Global Christianity and Mission), Dr. Jack Ammerman (AUL Digital Initiatives and Open Access, BU Libraries), and at least one more faculty member.

We have been assured that 100 per cent of the funds raised in support of the

torical material to the DACB database.

How does it work? The first step is to create a user account on the wiki "homepage" at www.DACB.org/wiki/. All that is requested is some basic personal information and a working email address (necessary). Once the user is registered, the account must be activated either through the user's email or the administrator.

Once the user account is activated, the user can login to the wiki site and begin writing! It is important to start by reading the instructions on the homepage, the guidelines for writers, and the FAQs.

Before beginning a biography, one should check that the *DACB* does not already contain an article on that same per-

son. For this there is a link to the Potential Subjects pages on the *DACB*. Carefully check the list for your subject. The potential subject pages are also good places to find ideas of biographies that need writing

Biographies must have sources listed. The wiki software will prompt you to list sources. Oral sources, for example, are valid (interviews, casual or formal). Once your part of the biography is written, tell others about the site and have them contribute to your biography. Biographies on the wiki that meet *DACB* standards for format and content will eventually be transferred to the main *DACB* Web site.

tracks: World Christianity, Islamic Studies, and Missions. In the list of goals included in the CWC's five year strategic plan, the eighth goal is "to help take the *Dictionary of African Christian Biography* to the next level by facilitating a network of partner institutions in Africa (at least ten), establishing an annual conference on the *DACB*, initiating a student prize for best biography of the year, formalizing the partnership between AIU/CWC and *DACB*, and generating 100 articles per year." Two chapel services highlighting the *DACB* took place in the last week of January 2012. In addition, in April, an ecumenical, *DACB/CWC* co-sponsored history conference will take place at AIU, entitled "Telling our Story: African Christians, African Church, and African Society."
